Dillwynia Expo, NAIDOC Celebration & Staff Meeting

Shari Martin, the General Manager of Dillwynia Correctional Centre, recently invited WIPAN to attend both the NAIDOC Celebration and the Expo at Dillwynia. NAIDOC was a wonderful morning of traditional dancing, singing and ceremony presented by women prisoners, celebrating their Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultural heritage. The choir sang beautifully, a poem was humbly recited and a touring indigenous comedian had the women in roars of laughter. It was fantastic to be a part of the celebration and particularly so watching the pride plastered across the women's faces as they received certificates of achievement from Shari for their individual successes – including the demonstration of great work ethic and the completion of studies.

The Expo at Dillwynia occurs every few months and is an opportunity for relevant organisations to go into the prison and speak to the women directly about their service and the needs of the

women. WIPAN spoke to several women about the mentoring program, which was received with great interest. The women voiced a need for support outside of their normal peer groups upon release, many of whom would have no other social support should they decide to change their life direction.

We are very grateful to Shari Martin and all the staff at Dillwynia for being gracious hosts, a great source of information and for allowing us valuable contact with women pre-release.

An Ex-Prisoners Story

Getting Out

I am 36 years of age. I've spent many years being a frequent flyer in and out of jail, living an active addiction, crime and being homelessness living on the streets.

Usually when I get out, I'm so anxious and overwhelmed in anticipation to get out. The first thing I do is run to the streets and GET ON!!!!

This time I am trying something different as I am so sick of getting locked up and doing time in jail!!!

So my day has finally come, I am being released back into the world again. I was so excited, nervous, anxious, sad and happy. Just totally overwhelmed with every emotion and thought possible.

I was being driven by the chaplain of the jail to a Rehab. In my head at the time I thought WOOHOO I'm GETTING OUT. If I can do all the time in jail that I have done, 6 months in rehab I can do that too, what have I got to lose. So I was driven to Rehab. As we left the jail I was so excited and scared at the same time. I was so overwhelmed with sights sounds and the feeling of cruising on the freeway in a car. I was overwhelmed with all the choices that were lying before me.

It was all happening!! I'm so glad that I had someone to drive me to my destination and that I had a safe place to go too.

By the time I got to rehab I was a mess just so spun out!! It's actually taken about 3 weeks to actually come down mentally and emotionally from being in jail and it's still a process now.

I'm now off drugs finding out who I am for the first time in my life.

WIPAN were invited to attend the Newtown Agencies Group (NAG) by Sue Steedman of [Our Place](#) and Paul Adabie of [Newtown Neighbourhood Centre](#). NAG is a network of community organisations that comes together seeking to address social issues pertinent to the Newtown area. The topic of discussion was boarding houses, specifically tenants' rights within the residential tenancy act and the standards in which these houses are kept.

We heard from Carly about [Rosemounts](#) which is a service aimed at young persons and their family offering counselling (general & specialist), research & advocacy, day programs and a study support centre.

James from [Redfern Community Centre](#) talked about the centre that is a multicultural centre and offers employment, education, legal, childcare, community events and recreational services.

Service of the Month

[Women's & Girls' Emergency Centre](#) is a drop in centre for homeless women and their children in the Inner City of Sydney.

"We provide access to basic necessities such as food, showers, washing machines, material and social assistance, a safe space, and a place to create community. We also provide case management services to assistance women to access housing, medical, drug and alcohol, mental health, legal and other services"

"The women we support are predominantly long term homeless women, who have little family and community support. Many of the women have lived transient lifestyles impacted by issues such as domestic violence; history of sexual assault; mental health; drug and alcohol use, and come from a variety of diverse backgrounds"

WIPAN recently needed some clothes for a women client who, due to bail conditions, was unable to buy any clothing post-release. After calling [WAGEC](#) and discussing her situation they invited us to come to their service and collect a large bag of clothing for her. We found the women workers to be very warm and welcoming and their donations to our client incredibly generous. We would like to thank [WAGEC](#) for the fantastic service and support that they offer women and girls.
